













Diabetic Foot Ulcer - Total Contact Casting Obtaining PharmaCare Covered Orthotics Offloading Devices NSWOCs/WCs Process

- The Nurse Specialized in Wound Ostomy Continence (NSWOC) or Wound Clinician (WC), who is in a Health Authority defined NSWOC/WC position, determines if Total Contact Casting (TTC) therapy is appropriate for a diabetic client diagnosed with a Diabetic Foot Ulcer (DFU) condition.
- 2. NSWOC/WC discusses TCC therapy with client's Physician/Nurse Practitioner as well as other members of the client's team.
- 3. The NSWOC starts the TCC therapy. The clinic where the TCC therapy must to be on the <u>British Columbia Health Authority Outpatient/Ambulatory Clinics -Total Contact Casting (TCC)</u> list. This list is used by the Orthotic providers to ensure the referral is coming from a health authority operated clinic. To have a clinic added to the list, please contact your Health Authority NSWOC Lead.
- 4. The <u>Orthotics Referral Post Completion of Total Contact Casting (TCC)</u> form is completed prior to wound closure. The following is required to ensure PharmaCare approval for coverage of the custom-made offloading inserts and shoes:
 - The name of the listed Health Authority Outpatient/Ambulatory Clinic and
 - The name of the NSWOC/WC, <u>or</u> physician/nurse practitioner overseeing the TCC treatment in the clinic.

Note: The Orthotics site must be on the <u>BC PharmaCare Enrolled Orthotics Providers</u> list.

- 5. Upon receiving the referral from a British Columbia Health Authority Outpatient/Ambulatory Clinic-Total Contact Casting, the Orthotist sees the client to determine the client's offloading device(s) treatment plan and submits an application to PharmaCare for approval of coverage.
- 6. PharmaCare approves the devices for coverage. There are three PharmaCare plans that provide coverage subject to the person's type of plan and deductible requirements:
 - Plan I (Fair PharmaCare) coverage is income-based and clients may need to pay a deductible and/or family maximum; client must have active MSP coverage and be registered with Fair PharmaCare to get maximum coverage.
 - Plan B is for permanent residents of a Long Term Care facility; 100% coverage for eligible costs with no deductible or family maximum; the facility must be registered with PharmaCare.
 - Plan C is for clients receiving income assistance and/or disability benefits from the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction (SDPR); 100% coverage for eligible costs with no deductible or family maximum.

Note: the client may have other forms of coverage for these types of devices:

• Eligible First Nations persons are covered through First Nations Health Authority/Pacific Blue Cross Medical Supplies & Equipment Benefits program; or Non-Insured Health Benefits (NIHB).

- SDPR provides funding (separate from PharmaCare Plan C) for adult orthoses through their Health Supplements Program.
- Private insurance.
- 7. When the client's wound closes, TCC therapy is discontinued and client wears their offloading device(s) to maintain their wound as closed/healed and prevent recurrence or further injury.
- 8. PharmaCare will provide coverage for specific offloading devices as well as replacement and adjustments of the devices as per the link below:
